Flip the Script: Cursive Sees Revival in School Instruction

Cursive writing is looping back into style in schools across the country after a generation of students who know only keyboarding, texting and printing out their words longhand.

Alabama and Louisiana passed laws in 2016 mandating cursive proficiency in public schools, the latest of 14 states that require cursive. And last fall, the 1.1 million-student New York City schools, the nation's largest public school system, encouraged the teaching of cursive to students, generally in the third grade.

Class Notes

...Abstract art is taking over in Art History! The students are turning into Cubists as they explore Picasso's still lifes! More modern coming up.

House Panel Votes to Expand School Vouchers

Florida's scholarship programs for students with disabilities and for those from low-income families would be expanded under a proposal a Florida House panel approved this week.

The bill (HB 15) would make more children eligible for the Gardiner and McKay Scholarship Programs, which serve students with disabilities and would increase the per-student for the Tax-Credit Scholarship Program.

The bill adds more categories to the list of qualifying disabilities for the Gardiner Scholarship and the McKay Scholarship program would get a small change that reduces the requirements related to public school enrollment in the year before seeking a scholarship.
